Director's Notes:



The theatre is a laboratory for studying human beings. We are not interested in promoting a particular ideological or political point of view, but in using theatre to show how people live behind the big words and movements of our time.

Our subjects are people who can sit in the auditorium or appear onstage. We are not making opinions about others but are, first and foremost, researching and critiquing ourselves.

Is it possible to be influenced by circumstances to such an extent that we do something completely contrary to our beliefs? Is it possible that we do not know ourselves, our inner nature? Is it possible that desperation can drive us to radical action? Could it be that nothing is ever truly stable and predictable when confronted with the relentless unpredictability of life?

A family loses a child in unclear circumstances. Although at the time they accept the official position that it was an accident, six years later the question is revived with the appearance of a lawyer. They want the truth, but which truth? Whose truth? They want the cause of the terrible incident to be found somewhere "out there," but are unable or unwilling to face up to their own roles and actions, or even to the inexorable nature of reality: its randomness.

It is undoubtedly difficult to resist the psychological and intellectual distortions of a media-saturated world, but we cannot renounce our right and duty to take responsibility for our own actions. Ultimately, whether we realize it or not, we are left alone to live with the consequences of our actions, and that is a difficult task.

Even as we arm ourselves against extremist ideas, under the surface we are driven by instincts that are sometimes difficult to square with laws, cultural codes, or community expectations. Our fears and anger take hold of us with elemental force. Better to face it: we are instinct-driven creatures; we are fallible and contradictory by our nature. When despair takes us over, the scaffolding of convention and routine don't necessarily support us. The image we have of ourselves and our connection to others doesn't always help. Indeed, they may no longer be what we had thought they were.

The point of our story is not to pass judgments, but rather to disturb in order to invite reflection and conversation. In our view, there is no ultimate answer to the causes and purposes of human existence. We must always rethink everything and accept that mistakes, misunderstandings, and wrongdoing are as human as love, creativity, and solidarity.

Emma Attwood is an actor, writer, and director living in San Francisco, where she has recently worked with 3 Girls Theatre, Bread and Butter Theatre, Contra Costa Civic Theatre, and Fuse Theatre. Attwood received a TBA Creates Grant for her play The Lady and the Unicorn. She is a tutor for the Writing for Performance Master of Studies program at the University of Cambridge, and a co-founder of Write Her, Direct Her, a collective that supports women in film and theatre.

Alexsandro Bravo is a Santa Rosa High School ArtQuest theater alumni and has been acting since the third grade. He was selected for a 2019 paid internship at the Imaginists, performing in El show el arte es medicina. He works as a teacher's assistant, manages an indoor soccer team, makes YouTube videos, and is currently in the top two percent of players in Rocket League. He will attend Santa Rosa Junior College in the fall.

Since 1980, John Craven has acted in and/or directed for several theaters over the span of almost forty years, mostly in the North Bay, including a couple of theater projects with The Imaginists. Earlier (much earlier), Craven was fortunate to work with Zbigniew Cynkutis formerly of the Polish Laboratory Theater, as well as with fellow countryman Henrik Baranowski; the latter in George Tabori's Mein Kampf.
